This course examines the evolution and development of Sinhala writing system after introducing Brahmi scripts to Sri Lanka and reads a selection of inscriptions with special attention to their language and its significance in historical linguistics. While the literary and linguistic aspects of epigraphy are the primary focuses of this course, it will be useful for students who pursue degrees in Archaeology and History.
