Use creatively insights gained from the drama of the West and the East

Produce a learned piece of criticism of contemporary plays

Make use of some knowledge gained in the course for writing and directing new plays

Course Description

This course evaluates major dramatic traditions in the East and the West, and their influence on Sinhala drama. In addition, the history of Sinhala drama will be evaluated with extensive focus on Sinhalese folk drama and ritual. In the theoretical section of the course, the important aspects of Indian, Chinese, Japanese and Western dramatic theories and traditions will be introduced using appropriate dramas in Sinhala translation. Since modern Sinhala drama is the central feature of this course a selection of modern Sinhala plays is studied to examine the new trends in Sri Lankan theatre.
