Course Description

This course is an introduction to comparative methods of literary studies but its focus is the inter-relations between modern Sinhala literature and literatures from other national literary cultures such as American, British, French, Japanese and Russian. In addition, the course deals with the inter-textual dimensions of modern literature by attending to textual relations between literature and history, literature and biography, literature and cinema and so on. And the course will also look into what really happens when a text is translated and transported into a different literary culture.
